## Kentucky Farmers Use More Fertilizer

Kentucky farmers used 574,197 tons of fertilizer last year to increase crop yields per acre and cut costs of production; reports the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee in a statement based on National Plant Food Institute compilations. This was an increase of 24,505 tons compared with the preceding year.

The committee points out that 13 Corn Belt states used a total of 6,709,950 tons of fertilizer in the year ending December 31, 1954.

Fertilizer use in the various states was: Indiana, 1,161,909 tons; Ohio, 1,008,400 tons; Illinois, 897,322 tons; Missouri, 649,750 tons; Iowa, 600,222 tons; Michigan,

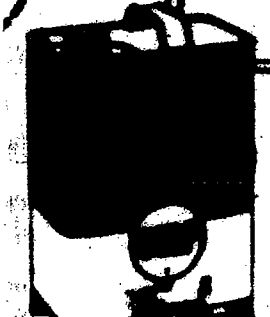

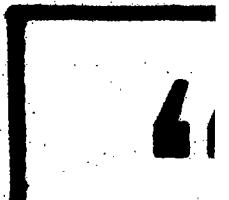

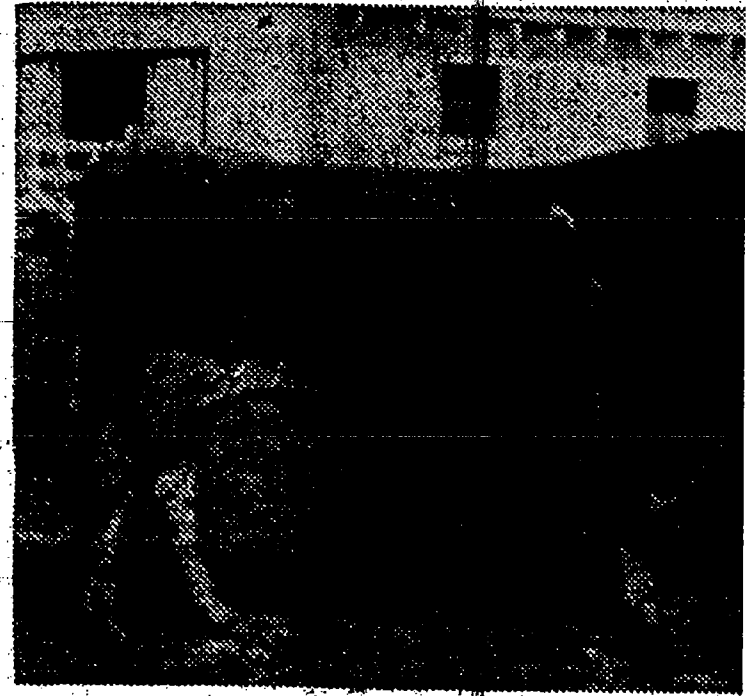

### Search Is Abandoned

DOGUBAYAZIDI, TURKEY.—The hunt for Noah's Ark by an American expedition has been abandoned. The search was called off after 12 days of fruitless search on Mount Ararat.

But, Dr. Aaron J. Smith, retired missionary from Greensboro, N.C., who led the search, thinks the wooden ark which the Bible says rode out the great flood, is still hidden somewhere on the rocky, three-mile-high mountain.

"We have cleared the way for future expeditions," Dr. Smith declared. "We expect other missions to complete the job we have begun."

Smith headed a group of five Americans who were escorted by Turkish soldiers over crags and through drifts of volcanic ash. The others were Walter Wood, Sea Cliff (N.Y.) development engineer; Wendell Ogg, Knoxville (Tenn.) physicist; E. J. Newton, Colfax (N. C.) interior decorator, and this correspondent.

Every part of Mount Ararat was searched, including the five mile plateau extending between the main mountain and small Ararat peak.

## Newest Super-Rocket Gives Science Idea Of Space-Ship Needs

LAS CRUCES, N. M.—Although America's newest super-rocket soared only 33 miles into the air, it was said to have given science a picture of what the first interplanetary space-ships may be like.

On the basis of the performance of the Viking II in a test flight when 95 per cent of all its intricate gadgets worked, the moon express of tomorrow may look like a pencil: thin, round and as high as a modern office building.

Strangest of all, it probably will not have any fins.

The 46 foot long Viking II, largest yet produced in the United States, was controlled in flight by changing the direction of the exhaust from its rocket tubes. It is equipped with fins, but they were not used.

"We eventually hope to eliminate fins entirely," says Dr. Homer E. Newell, rocket expert in the naval research laboratory at White Sands proving ground near here. "The drag on fins at extremely high speeds is tremendous."

The Viking II reached a speed of 1,775 miles an hour and an altitude of 33 miles. Its predecessor's top speed was 2,250 m.p.h. and it soared to a height of 50 miles. However, Newell termed the latest flight a success.

"We were after stability and control this time," he said. "Next time we will concentrate on engine performance."

In the test the fuel of liquid oxygen and alcohol burned for only 49 seconds, although there was enough for 65 seconds. The first Viking burned through 53 seconds of a similar load. Failure of the rockets to consume their full fuel loads has not been explained.

The navy plans to fire a total of 10 Vikings in its current research

## State Official Killed In North African A

### W. J. Hayes, Well Known In Meets Accidental Death

William J. Hayes, former assistant in the office of Attorney General Hubert Meyer Frankfort, where he was attached to the division of professional regulations, and at the time of his induction into army last December a practicing attorney in that city, met his death by accident July 15 in North Africa.

Official notification was received Monday by his wife, Alvinia Headley, director of child nursery program at Frankfort.

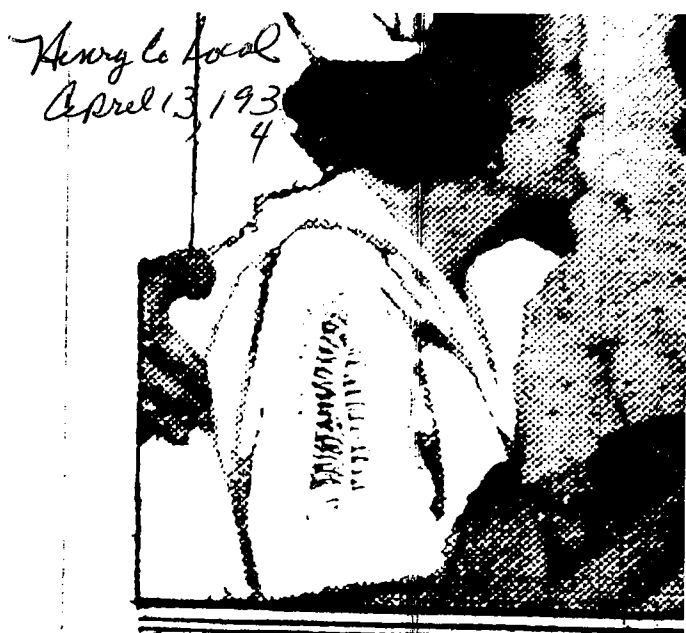

**Poll Proves Shoe Buyers Seek Comfort, Not Style**

The theory, held dear especially by the male sex, that most women will endure willingly any discomfort as long as vanity is served, received a setback in a recent survey conducted by the University of California Laboratory of Performance Physiology.

In the course of this study, some six hundred co-eds were questioned as to what influenced them most when buying shoes. To everyone's surprise, some ninety-eight percent considered comfort the most important single factor. To top it off, a smaller percentage of male students placed primary stress on comfort!

Price was a very minor consideration in purchasing new shoes, with only one-third of the female students rating it first. Results of the survey revealed that the average American girl realizes that foot fitness is a requisite for general body health and comfort. She has learned that well-fitting shoes that are equipped with flexible leather soles and supple uppers are not only smart but do wonders for a graceful stride and good posture.

Consulted in this connection, a leading foot specialist expressed little surprise at the outcome of the poll. He corroborated the close connection between foot care and body health, and cited medical histories of women patients who had been freed of a variety of foot complaints after being fitted with comfortable laced oxfords that had low heels and resilient leather soles and uppers.

With an estimated eight out of every ten older women complaining about foot ills, there is evidence in the University of California poll that young people are saving themselves the bone-twisting punishment suffered by their elders. Chances are these youngsters will go through life on sound feet.

**Sleep Well**

In a recent survey Dr. George Gallup, director of the American Institute of Public Opinion, discovered that "very happy" people sleep best of all, and the unhappy suffer most from insomnia. It is logical, of course, because the happiest people have the fewest worries and cares to torture them into becoming insomniacs. It stands to reason that the reverse of this statement could easily be the basis of Dr. Gallup's findings. If people sleep well, they are more inclined to be happy and carefree. Their daily worries are forgotten and dissolve from problems of enormous weight to mere trifles after a good night's sleep. It is logical, too, that the people who sleep on the most comfortable bedding are the most

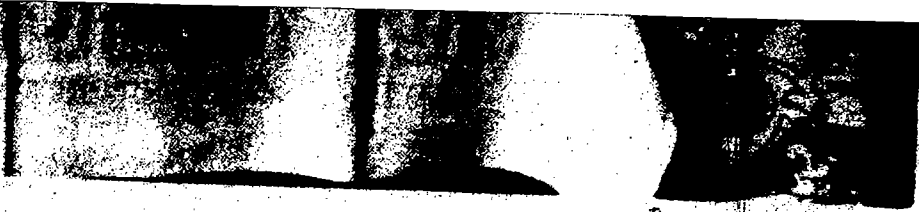

# SOIL TESTING CLINIC FIXED

To Be Held at Sulphur School, Monday, January 17

## LET SAMPLES DRY

There will be a soil testing clinic at the Sulphur school, Monday, January 17, from 8:00 a.m. to 12, and at the Henry County courthouse from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m., on the same day.

Farmers interested in having their soil tested should take samples now and allow them to become well dried before testing day. Samples can be taken by digging a hole about six inches deep then take soil for sample from top to bottom of hole. At least five samples should be taken per field. These samples are allowed to dry then thoroughly mixed. About one-half pint of the mixed soil is brought in for test.

Mr. S. C. Jones, specialist in soils, will be present to help each farmer interpret his soil reports.

The F.F.A., 4-H Club and G. I. boys will assist in carrying on the testing.

4. Always watch your step when running with a kite.

5. Never fly a kite from a roof or elevated structure. A fall can cripple a kite-flyer for life.

6. Never fly a kite on streets or highways or anywhere else where you might be injured by a car or truck.

7. Stay alert so a high wind or sudden gust won't throw you off balance or cause the cord to burn the skin as it slips through your hands.

8. Keep the cord neatly rolled so neither you nor others can trip over it.

9. If your kite breaks away and lodges in wires or a large tree, leave it there. Don't climb poles to get it down or try to knock it loose by hurling a stone with string attached over wires. It's better to lose a kite than lose a life.

## HENRY ROAD FUND HI

Truck License Fee State To County Is Up **\$11,378 THIS**

Frankfort, Ky., Sept. Henry County Road Fund \$11,378.39 higher this year because of the distribution license fees collected by W. P. Curlin, Commissioner of Highways said today. The distribution to all of the 120 counties consists of one-half of the truck license money equally.

The total return the past year from licenses on trucks mounted to \$1,365,406.80, an increase of 5.5 per cent over the previous fiscal year. Weights also paid by trucks are not included in the distribution.

signed investigators to the subject. The Washington Post last year sent a reporter to Bowling Green to check out Natcher. As was the case with others who had tried, the reporter came up with blanks—not even the slightest suggestion of impropriety on Natcher's part.

WHAT investigators come up with, as is confirmed by people who like and dislike Natcher, is a puzzling pastiche of a man who, if not eccentric, is at least a tincture of what is commonly thought of as other-century puritanical virtue and thrift.

Always conservatively attired and

find facts such as those above hard to reconcile with their own devil theory of the congressman's insistence that both freeways and subways be built into a "balanced" transportation system here.

What most don't realize—and they would have no way of realizing, since Natcher doesn't talk—is that his intractability most likely goes directly to his background and his reverence for Congress as an institution.

Many find it hard to believe when he says simply that the freeways must be built because Congress passed a law in 1968 directing that they be built. "As long as that law is on the books, I'm going

law in 1934. His daily journal discloses that from that moment on his most fervent wish was election to Congress. In 1936 and 1937, he was a federal conciliation commissioner in Western Kentucky. He became Warren County attorney in 1938, and held the post until 1950. Meanwhile, he served three years in the Navy during World War II and was an organizer and president of the Kentucky Young Democratic Clubs both before and after the war.

Although he was obviously a com- fighter in the party and although considered a leader for his political work with the Young Democrats, the Congressional nomination he so dearly sought passed him by several times.

The Democratic powers that were, after the war, picked John A. Whitaker to run for the Second District seat, which he won. When Whitaker died in 1951, Natcher wanted to run, but again had to wait. Garrett E. Withers got the nod, and he too, won election.

Withers won re-election to a full term in 1952, but he died in 1953. It finally was Natcher's turn and he was elected (unopposed, as was the case last Tuesday) to represent the Second District that year.

"They never sent a congressman from the Second District who wanted to come up here as bad as I did," he frankly told a reporter in 1953. He noted that his first campaign caused him to sweat of seven pounds as he traveled 3,800 miles in less than six weeks.

Since that time, he's had no serious political trouble in his ever-changing district. His closest call came in 1954, the year of the Eisenhower presidential sweep, when opponent R. B. Blankenship lost to him by about 2,000 votes.

GRAYER NOW at the temples, an 17 years older (he uses old photographs of himself and has dropped his birth date from his official biography), Natcher nevertheless moves at a youthful pace, with a long stride and spring step that belie his 61 years. He still campaigns with fervor—when opposed that is—and moves about Capitol Hill at a half-jog.

Constituents who come to his office find him eager to please them, and in addition to the glad hand he extends and the warm "My friend" greeting find themselves showered with flatter.

A favorite ploy is to invite visitors to seat themselves in the enormous chair behind his immaculately arranged desk at a vantage point which allows one to survey the strategically placed photographs of Natcher and Lyndon Johnson. Natcher with Jack Kennedy, Natcher on the front page of The New York Times.

Newspapers are one of his favorite subjects (an uncle was a Cleveland sports columnist), and he keeps close tabs on what is said about him in print. One of the newest framed additions to his office suite is an entire front page of The Washington Star that carries his name in a banner headline.

Unlike many congressmen, Natcher does not send out regular press releases. But he maintains close contact with editors of weeklies in his district, who often print his year-end pronouncements verbatim. Editors are favored with phone calls or telegrams announcing projects he has arranged in their counties, and his office aides dutifully post printed results in clipping scrapbook.

groomed to a fault, Natcher wears stiffly starched white shirts. He doesn't smoke; doesn't drink; is deeply devoted to his family; drives a well-used automobile. His thoughts, his triumphs and his defeats are recorded in a personal daily journal that next year will go into its 18th leather-bound volume. The books are kept in an office safe, and only members of the Natcher family are allowed to read them.

He has a mania for several things. One is attendance. He hasn't missed a single roll call since coming to Congress, and he once vowed that he would build such

# JoAnne Tingle named engineer of the year

Jo Anne Tingle, an engineer with the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet (KYTC) was presented the "2003 Young Member Award" from the Southern District Institute of Transportation Engineers on April 20 in Covington. She was recognized for her outstanding service to the transportation engineering profession. This award has been given since 1993 and Jo Anne is only the second woman to receive the honor.

Jo Anne works in the Department of Highways in Frankfort's central office, where she manages the scholarship program for civil engineering students at four Kentucky universities.

Therefore, her role in mentoring young engineers is one Jo Anne performs on a daily basis. The Cabinet's civil engineering scholarship program is the oldest and largest program in the nation and currently there are 71 students in the program. In addition to working with college students, she is also a frequent presenter for the Kentucky Engineering Exposure Network (KEEN) that seeks to interest children in careers in engineering.

Jo Anne also manages the Cabinet's Engineer-in-Training Rotation Program for recent graduates. She teaches the traffic portion of the University of Louisville's professional engineer review and the American Society of Civil Engineer's traffic review. She has been a frequent presenter at national conferences throughout the nation.

The Joseph M. Thomas Young Member Award is presented annually to a member of the Southern District, who is under the age of 35 and who, by their example and personal efforts, has inspired younger members to greater service. The namesake for the award, Joseph M. Thomas, is an engineer in Georgia. Among his many accomplishments in the

A licensed professional engineer, she has also been a member and held offices with the American Society of Civil Engineers from 1999-2002.

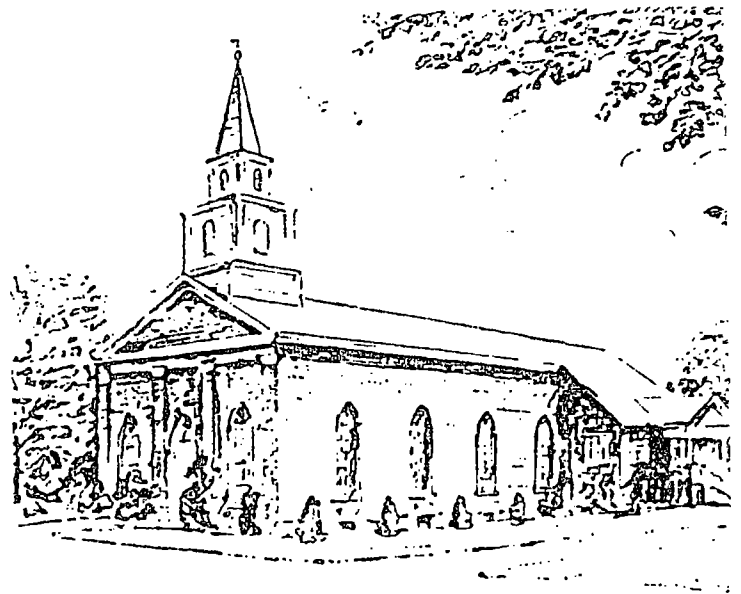

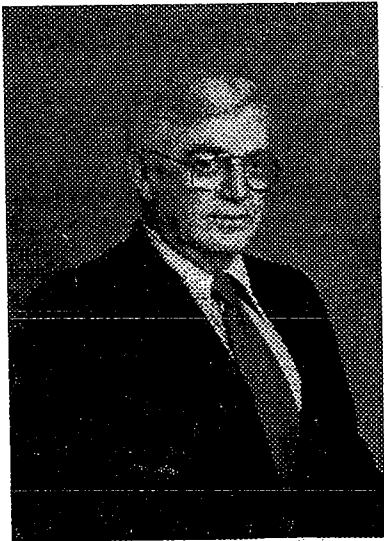

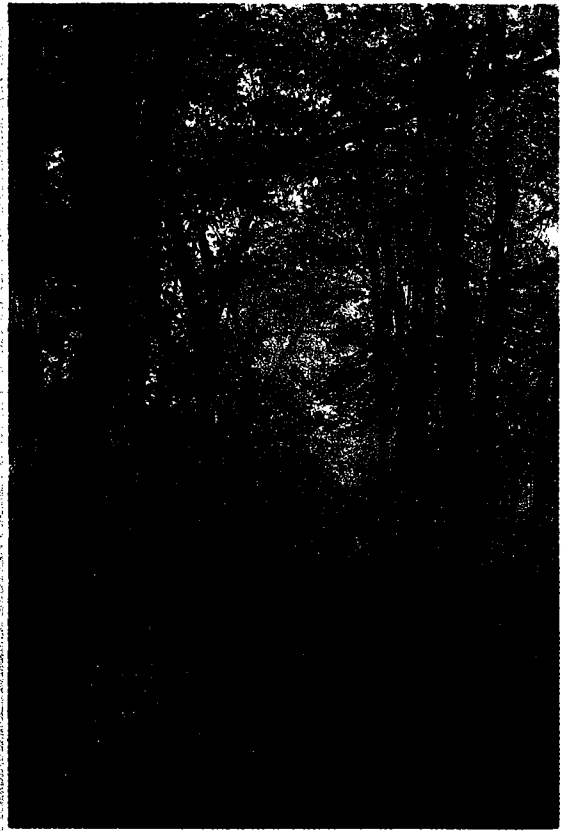
