THOMAS B. HARLAN DIES AT AGE OF 68

Attorney Here for 44 Years Was Ill for Prolonged Period.

Thomas Bartlett Harlan, attorney here for 44 years, with offices in the Central National Bank Building, died Wednesday following a prolonged illness at his home, 609 Clara avenue. He graduated from the Law School of Washington University in 1893.

Mr. Harlan, who was 68, was born in Brooklyn, and moved to Missouri with his parents when a child. He attended public schools of Pike County, and attended the University of Missouri before moving to St. Louis in 1888.

Admitted to the bar, Mr. Harlan became a member of the law firm of Reynolds & Harlan. This firm was later known as Reynolds, Koehler, Reiss & Harlan. Since 1909 it has been Reynolds & Harlan.

Mr. Harlan was vice president of the St. Louis, Rocky Mountain & Pacific Railway Company, and later became general counsel for the organization.

Funeral services will be held this afternoon in Louisiana, Mo., where the body will be taken from the Lupton undertaking establishment, 449 Olive street, at 3:45 o'clock this morning.

Surviving are his widow, the former Miss Lena L. Carroll, and one married daughter, who resides in East.

I. B. HARLAN FUNERAL AT LOUISIANA, MO.

Lawyer in Practice in St. Louis for 43 Years Victim of Leukemia.

Funeral services for Thomas B. Harlan, an attorney here for 43 years, who died Wednesday of leukemia at his home, 609 Clara avenue, were held today at Louisiana, Mo. He was 68 years old.

Until a year ago, when he retired because of ill health, Mr. Harlan maintained offices in the Central National Bank Building. He was a partner of Matthew G. Reynolds, a former Judge of the Circuit Court, until Reynolds' death in 1923.

Mr. Harlan was born in Brooklyn, N. Y., and moved with his family to Pike County, Mo., when he was a child. He attended grade school there and later was a student at the University of Missouri. In 1888 he moved to St. Louis and attended the St. Louis Law School, from which he was graduated in 1893. He had been admitted to the bar the year before graduation.

Mr. Harlan began his law practice as a partner of Judge Reynolds. Later he was associated with Perry Post Taylor, before he returned to practice with Reynolds in the firm of Reynolds, Koehler, Reiss & Harlan. When Reynolds was elected Circuit Judge, the firm became Harlan, Reiss & Wagner, and when Judge Reynolds' term was completed he and Mr. Harlan again became partners.

For several years Mr. Harlan was vice president of the St. Louis, Rocky Mountain & Pacific Railway Co., also serving as its general counsel.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Lee Carroll Harlan; a daughter, Mrs. Kennon V. Rothschild of Chicago, and a son, Carroll Harlan, who resides in California. Carroll Harlan was formerly Assistant United States District Attorney here and Judge Advocate of the St. Louis Police Department.
