On this 31st day of July 1855. Personally appeared before
The subscriber, a Judge of the Court in and for Mercer County. Jonathan
Hearline, a resident of Slippery Rock Township Mercer County and
State of Pennsylvania aged 80 years, who being duly sworn ac-
cording to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in
order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed the 7th June
1832. — That he entered the service of the United States, under the
following named officers and served as herein stated. —
He ~~entered the~~ ^{joined} service in Chester County Pennsylvania, by being
called out under Captain ^{Treasury} Moore. The first of June 1777. his Lieut^r
was James Jones. — 2^d Lieut. — McHuib — we marched to a place
called Iron Hill, then to Whately Creek at Mill Town, and then to
Wilmington — and so on from place to place as circumstances
required. untill our time was up, being in actual service not
less than six months — being in the immediate neighbour
hood where the British were, we were not discharged or dismissed
untill the last of November. Co! Spear commanded and
Major ~~Spencer~~ McClallon was his Major — and Command
ed the Militia at that time. The standing army ~~was~~ ^{was at}
that time ~~beginning~~ ^{was} towards the Valley Forge, Yellow Spring & Reading
in the State of Pennsylvania.
Again in 1781. In Chester County Penna. He was called into service
under Capt. Moore & same officers as before, we marched up to the
valley hill, to ~~leave~~ ^{leave} the army and word came that the war was
over — and were discharged being ~~not~~ ^{left} one week in the
actual service. — and returned home —
Here he says that in ~~1775~~ ^{the winter of} 76 — He was called on by the
Wagon Master and set to drive a Public Team ~~Team~~ ^{which he drove} not less than
six months. and again in ~~fall~~ ^{the winter} of 1776 & 1777. he was employed to at-
tend and feed & take care of a large number of Public Cattle,
and in the Spring of 1777. the Cattle were sent to Reading to be out
the way of the enemy. in that employ he was not less than five
months. Being called to that business by the Commissary. making
in all one year and five months & six days — for which he claims
a pension; — The time is so long passed that it is difficult to recollect
dates particularly. — He says he has no documentary testimony
nor does he know of any living witnesses to prove his services
there were several in this County some years ago — but
they are all dead & gone — who could have proved his service.

He says he was born in Chester County Penn^a and June 17th 1755
Has no record of his age, but has often saw his Father's record
of his birth. He was always called into service in Chester
County Penn^a. He's always served for himself.
He always entered the service, being regularly called or drafted.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension
or annuity except the present, and declares that his name
is not on the Pension Roll of the Agency of any State.
He farther states that through bodily infirmity he is not
able to attend the Court, being very infirm, and much trou-
bled with pains—

Jonathan Harlin for thirty years, who is now applying for
a pension. I have no doubt but he may be 80 years of age
and know that he reports a good character, for truth and
veracity, have never heard it called in question, but
consider him entitled to belief.

Be it known that on the 2^o day of November 1836 Person-
ally appeared before the subscriber, a Judge of the Court in and
for said County Jonathan Harlan of Mercer County, the within
applicant for pension, who being duly sworn according to law did
depose and say that the reasons he did not apply sooner under
the law of 7th June 1832 were that he considered that he
did in the Revolutionary war, ^{was} just discharging duty when
our all was at stake, to do any duty for Independence or
live under tyranny, next he did not like the idea of being
a pensioner, and he was old infirm and not well able to look
to it or attend Court to have it done, But finding himself
more needy and less able to provide for himself and his old
Companion, being now unable to do any work or walk about he
prevailed on Judge Brown to ^{come to} him (as he was unable to go to Court)
and attend to the business for him &c.

I do hereby officially certify that this present applicant Jonathan
Harlan is a man of good character for truth and veracity entitled to
credit and belief, and after investigating the matter, and putting the
interrogatories prescribed by the ^{War} department. I am of the opinion
that the foregoing applicant was a Soldier of the revolutionary
war, as he has stated and performed the services which he has stat-
ed in his declaration and also that Alexander Buring & Hugh
Bingham are credible persons and entitled to belief.

And I know that the Rev^d William Wood who signed the foregoing
certificate is a clergyman in good standing in the Presbyterian
Body. And I am satisfied that Jonathan Harlan, was and
now is, unfit to attend Court, by disease, old age, & pains, without
suffering more than what he might be entitled to require of him.
